NSWCCPE invites you to attend an interactive supervision workshop, broken into four three-hour Zoom sessions, to be held over two half days in July/August and two half days in October. These sessions will be led by Michael Paterson and Liz Crumlish from the Institute of Pastoral Supervision & Reflective Practice.

Michael has been invited to present two topics which form the foundational underpinning of pastoral supervisory practice. The topics are: Becoming a Reflexive Practitioner, and Group Supervision. The July-August sessions will introduce each topic and work on developing and strengthening basic understandings and practice. The October sessions will reinforce and further develop the earlier learnings.

Each topic will be presented in an interactive Zoom format using breakout groups, so that all present have an opportunity to work experientially. The late-day southern hemisphere time corresponds to early morning in Scotland. Michael and Liz will get up early. We will be working late.

Supervisors in NSW are required to attend these workshops as part of the mandatory professional development offered for the Supervisors in Formation program. All other supervisors in ANZACPE and Transforming Practices are invited to participate in this educational offering.

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Workshop One The Reflexive Self

The Reflexive Self:

Part One 31 July 2020, 4-7pm, AEST

Part Two 23 October 2020, 4-7pm, AEDT

'We don't bring cases to supervision. We *are* the case!' John Paton.

Supervision often takes the form of casework management in which supervisees report on their work with clients. While there is a place for that approach, this workshop starts from a different place and retrains the focus on what working with clients reveals about the supervisee as a reflective practitioner. This approach may be summarised as 'we don't supervise the work, we supervise the one who does the work.' As such presence becomes more important than performance and intimacy of much higher value than competence.

This workshop includes teaching input, live demonstration, skills practice, small group work and plenary interaction.

Part Two, will draw on insights and reflections gained during the three month interval since Part One and will foster the reflexive agility which enables us to reflect-*in*-action (as things happen in the live, clinical or pastoral moment) and not only reflect-*on*-action (after the event in supervision).

Workshop Two Group Supervision

Group Supervision:

What do we mean by group supervision: One on one supervision with others watching?; A free for all? The survival of the fittest? Group supervision suffers from being poorly understood and poorly facilitated. Managed badly it unleashes exhibitionism in the narcissist and withdrawal in the vulnerable. Managed well it releases creativity, awakens the unconscious and democratises insight. Key to this is the management of the self generously offered and made available in the service of others.

This workshop includes personal reflection, input, live group work demonstration, breakout space and plenary interaction. Part Two will reflect on participants' experience three months later and add different supervisory modalities which go beyond telling the story verbally.
